
THIRD THURSDAY PREVIEW

The General Meeting for September will be on the 20th at 7:30 PM. The hosts will be Mike Laine and Philo Bemis, at their shop, 2200 Adeline Street, Oakland (directions follow). Out guest speaker will be Andre Sartor of Sartor Saw Works, San Francisco. Andre is an intense and affable young man who knows a lot about circular saw blades and other cutting tools. The outline he gave me for his presentation sounded like we might all be interested to hear him, whether we were large production shop owners or weekend hobbyists. Especially, in matters of maintenance and adjustment of power saws, Andre has much to deliver. A sample question: why does a 40-tooth carbide blade cut more smoothly than one with a greater number of teeth? The stroboscope nows, and so will we. After our midmeeting open time (see below), we are hoping to deliver upon the delayed promise of the demonstration of joining machines (Virutex and Lamello). These wafer slot makers will be backed up with demonstrations of Nail Guns: Senco (as shown in Popular Woodworking lately) and Senclamp. If you have a smaller model, such as a brad gun, please bring it. We hope everything fits Philo's compression hose.





COMMENTS ON AN ITEM IN AUGUST 1984 NEWSLETTER

I was surprized by the Page 1 report on David Cobb's and my little seminar on tropical rain forests. Some comments:

"Harold Waldron agreed to don the unhappy role of 'devil's advocate' for the hardwood importing industry."

My name is Howard Waldron, and to say my role was an unhappy one seems to me unwarrentedly judgmental.

"He recounted his lengthy efforts to preserve and wisely manage some of the riches of Brazil, and the frustration at learning of the failures of his plans."

This misses the real points. The gist of my message follows. The job or problem of preserving as is the require rain forests of Brazil is a truly difficult one—basically because it would probably freezing the Amazon in its status quo. (Think, for example, of an analogous attempt to freeze development or change in the State of California, in its industry and its population.)

The best preservers of Brazil's rain forests are the large- and medium-sized Amazonian timber companies, which are required by law to work on the basis of projects approved by SUDAM (Superintenency for the Development of the Amazon). In any area to be logged, SUDAM restricts the cutting to 50% of a targeted area, and requires 100% reforestation. SUDAM is able to enforce these requirements because it offers two financial advantages—-low-cost loans and major federal tax advantages. These financial breaks put SUDAM in control. I import my lumber from a major company working under a SUDAM-controlled project, and I know that the company I deal with is, as the best of our large U.S. timber companies are, one of the best caretakers of the timber resources. No hanging of the head here by Howard Waldron.

I would appreciate your running these comments in the next issue.
