
THIRD THURSDAY PREVIEW






BAVA SHOW

WOODY'S WORKSHOP

The last Saturday in April, L. A. "Woody" Woodward opened up his shop to a small group of fellow BAWA members for an informal afternoon get together. Upon arriving at his home, one could immediately see the influence of his woodworking. We were to learn later that his home was originally a single story dwelling; lacking the room on his lot for a shop, he literally built his shop from the floor up on top of the second floor over his garage. He stated that it took him about two years, and he said that much thought and planning went into the shop's design before he hammered his first nail.

When a visitor arrives at "Woody's Workshop", as identified by the sign on his door, it is difficult not to express admiration. In an area of about 600 square feet, Woody's shop was well laid out, with every concievable tool that a well equiped shop imaginably would contain.

While roaming through the shop, one sees at every turn, his devotion to organization—a display in art. From small files to pipe clamps, handsaws to routers, all have their own special nook for storage, whether it be on the wall or in a drawer. I even reflected that there was not one sheet of pegboard in sight—let alone a pegboard hook—yet all was definitely at his immediate disposal.

When I first met Woody last fall, we spoke of Dust Collection Systems. He had described hisown system to me, but actually seeing it was another surprise. Every machine had an inlet set up to it, and the system's runs of pipe were well laid out and attached onto the cieling. Another item of interest, were the "gates"—— each having a micro—switch that would automatically turn on the dust collector when the gate was engaged. And was it ever quiet!

Then there was the "Woodymachine", the most elaborate overhead router I had ever seen— and all constructed from parts by Woody himself. We all saw the thought that went into his machine as he demonstrated the workings. He got as much pleasure speaking on his shop, the machines, and the jigs, as we got listening to him.

Over near the door, I noticed an electric winch set-up that was mounted on a heavy duty steel frame and attached to the wall. Upon inquiring as to its purpose, he directed our attention to a trap door on the floor. It is through this set-up that he lifts all his lumber into the shop, and it was originally used to bring up the machinery! It was quite an enjoyable afternoon, and we all again thank him for his time and the opportunity of viewing his shop. If anyone deserves the "handle", it surely is "Woody".

In the event that enough entries are submitted to cover our needs, a \$50 gift certificate to one or distribution locations will be awarded.


