

ing. John Littrell, of San Leandro, is new to woodworking, and Sterling Dogan is a woodworking instructor at Shopsmith, and also has his own shop in Oakland.

Fred was using our new SOUND SYSTEM—and a very nice thing it was, to be able to hear everyone speak, in a noisy shop. The speaker is in a case built by Ernie Werkheiser—thank you Ernie!

STAN BOOKER introduced our host, CARL GIANNI. The introduction was a very special moment for Stan. Not only did he and Carl study together to be shop teachers at SF State in 1974, but also present was their favorite teacher, Dr John Kassay. Dr Kassay was persuaded to say a few words, and mentioned that he had started working with wood 60 years ago! He has promised to do a program for us later this year, either on Shaker furniture or windsor chairs, subjects he is an expert on.

Carl has a busy shop, Heritage Repair, in Belmont, specializing in stripping and refinishing. He has been doing this for 3 years, and mentioned that he felt like he hadn't paid his dues, being a woodworker who prospered right from the start and never had to starve getting started! It's a fine big funky

shop, filled with interesting old pieces of furniture being worked on. He has six employees, and besides furniture specializes in wooden auto dashboards, and has done some custom turning.

Carl demonstrated his mysteries on a set of chairs that was in various stages of refinishing. His shop does not do any dipping or soaking in stripping old finishes. He said that dipping has good and bad points. It is great for removing thick old paint, but it can fatigue veneers and glue joints. He saturates pieces, but doesn't leave them to soak.

He started by doing some simple hand stripping, by way of encouraging us to do it ourselves. I was certainly encouraged. Carl says that common commercial strippers like Jasco are good products. Work in a clean area, and give the chemicals time to work. Do one small area at a time. Brass or nylon brushes, toothbrushes, steel wool-all are helpful. Once you have removed the old varnish, neutralize the stripper by rinsing it off with Acetone. This will prevent striping chemicals from interfering with finishes later.

Repairs should be done after stripping, except if veneer is starting to lift—stop before stripping makes it worse.

We then proceeded to the stripping tank to see how they actually do it in the shop. Carl set the chair in a low-walled steel tank and hosed it with methalene chloride which is circulated by a pump through a small hose with a brush attached to the end. As he brushed and squirted, the old varnish just washed away like dirt. I don't know if it is always that easy, but it was an exhilarating thing to watch! A chair takes about five minutes. This process is NOT recommended for home use.

Repairs are next, and then sanding. Palm sanders and flap-wheels are useful. A good tip: Quartering your sheets of sandpaper and then folding the pieces into thirds makes a handy sized piece.

Then we took the chair to the spray booth. Finishing starts

with a rubbed-on base coat of stain. Carl uses Minwax stains,

because they are very compatible with the cellulose lacquer he uses—it can be applied five minutes after the stain. Remember, stains can vary from one dyelot to another.

Next a coat of sanding sealer was sprayed on. If you don't have spray facilities, he recommends Deft applied with a good



brush. Then Carl started spraying with lacquer tinted with UTC colors. What a pretty thing that was. The base-coat of stain didn't look like much, but with coats of tinted lacquer going on, zip zip, more coats on lighter sections of wood, then we could see that the chair was going to look very nice.

Show & Tell

Gene Wagg brought in some wooden wing-nuts he had made by inserting T-nuts into diamond-shaped pieces of wood. They are much easier to turn than ordinary wing-nuts.
