Your host will be Carl Gianni. Mr.
Gianni has turned an enjoyable hobby of antique furniture into a full time 4 year business.
He will demonstrate the steps in repair and refinishing. So come on down and enjoy!

Show & Tell

The first, and most impressive item shown was Phil Jansen's beautiful Victorian hall-tree (a hall-tree is a chair with a high back equipped with hooks for hanging clothes on and a mirror for twirling ones mustache). Phil's is cherry, finished with Bartley stains and varnishes. Phil says the Bartley stains are more like dyes than stains-they color the wood without filling the pores with pigments. He recommends them highly, and also the Bartley Varnishes. Both the



stains and varnishes are gels—you rub them on and off—they are very easy to use. The seat of the hall-tree is inlaid with 4 old dutch

tiles.

Dick Golden brought in a small cabinet with mitered finger-joints inlaid with purpleheart—he said the inlays came about because the finger joints weren't quite the right size!

Alton Jensen showed two clocks. One had the hour-spots on the face made with dowels glued into holes and sanded flat

to make light-colored circles. One had a semi-circular top the semi-circle was rough-cut on the bandsaw, then smoothed on the disk-sander by pivoting the clock around a dowel inserted in a hole in the back. He also passed around some nifty wooden name-tags with the names cut-in by laser. The lettering was as delicate and perfect as the finest penmanship or printing. It is expensive—the machinery to do it will set you back 10 million dollars, so the output is pricey, but we will check to see if just possibly we can get a reasonable price for a group order.

Alan Fanning showed us an old Stanley #82 scraper. Stan Booker, who teaches shop, unveiled a most impressive toboggon, built from a plan in an old woodshop textbook. The toboggan is made of hickory, bent after being soaked in hot water for 3 days.

Carl Johnson has been "messing around with hand-cut dovetails." He says the hardest part, when cutting the pins, is getting the line perpendicular with the surface. He brought in a "cheater block" to clamp on to keep the saw vertical. Very handy.

Dave Sowa brought in

a most appealing book, The Illustrated Handbook of Furniture Restoration by George Buchannon. It is exceptional for its illustrations of the use and sharpening of hand-tools. Unfortunatly it is out-of-print. Dave found it on a bargain table. If anyone runs into it at a bookstore please grab an extra copy for me (John Weidner, an incurable bookaholic!) He also showed us a Bridge City depthgauge, an absurdly handsome little thing. It's also one of the 13 fatal indicators of a toolaholic!

Thank you one and all for sharing with the group. Carl Johnson won the prize for May, something you never have enough of, a set of clamps. And for you, gentle reader, if you haven't brought anything in to show lately, bestir yourself! Remember that only those who bring things to show are eligible for the door prize!

Why use Veneer?

Our speaker for the evening was Eric Joseph. He has a shop in Redwood City, where he makes and repairs veneered furniture. He started out with the question "why use veneer?" Veneer is often considered "cheap," but actually takes three times the work of solid wood. Veneer is stable. It can cover end-grain. And of course you can stretch a special piece of wood to cover a large surface.

Eric deprecates commercial veneers. "They are so thin the glue sometimes seeps right through the wood!" If you have a bandsaw, you can cut your own. He has cut veneers on many different bandsaws and says the common 14" bandsaw will work just fine. Use a fairly coarse blade (3-4 TPI), as wide as possible. Have the blade very tight. Tune up your saw—make sure the two wheels are in the



same plane. He likes "coolblocks," and disdains bi-metallic blades. You will need a fence (a flat fence, not those V-shaped blocks that are often used), a little bit higher than your stock. Since blades never cut exactly straight, your fence will have to be clamped at a slight angle to the blade—test on a scrap piece until you get the angle right. If you change blades you will have to check your angle again.

Push your board through slowly and steadily—don't stop. If well sawn your veneers will be smooth enough for glue.

Eric cuts veneers 1/8" thick. These are thick enough to edge-joint. Make a shooting board and use a long plane. This is the only way to get an invisible join between two veneers. To glue them together you can lay them beween two clamped fences with a small gap between the two veneers. Then use little wedges

to press them together. Yellow glue works well. You can hold them down with weights—use wax paper to keep the weights from sticking.

Eric likes to use Baltic or lumber-core plywood for a substrate. Always veneer both sides or "your plywood will turn into a potato chip." 1/8 inch-thick veneers are much like

solid wood—if damaged you can work them with a scraper, or possibly even with a plane (not recommended).


