as always. We're looking forward to an interesting and educational evening.


When Last We Met

We all learned a great deal and took home lots of new ideas. Thanks to both of you.





One project that one of his students is working on is a router jig for cutting ellipses (I think that's the plural of ellipse!) Anyway, it's a jig to cut an elliptical table-top, and they have been exercising their wits over the arcane topic of how much to adjust the jig to produce a specific size-change in the finished ellipse.



'He is interested in techniques "that will put shoes on my children's feet." Dick Taylor is always worth listening to. However, his rapidfire delivery kept your newsletter editor from catching more than a small part of what he said. Dick likes to emphasize that he is only interested in techniques


"that will put shoes on my children's feet." Quicker and cheaper ways to get the job done are what he likes. He enthuses about John Dupont's drawer joint, which can be made with one router set-up. He passed around a jig he had made for that joint, with a De-sta-co clamp to hold your drawer side in place.

Norma mentioned that if you are making many drawers the same width, you can rout the joints on a larger piece and then cut it into sides, but the piece had better be very well squared!

"You've always
been told," (says Dick)
" to put a plough in
the drawer side to
hold the drawer bottom." (A
plough is a dado running with
the grain. Shop teachers know
these things.) "But if you are
using Blum guides or other
guides that attach under the
bottom edges of the drawer, you
don't have to do that." You can
just nail or screw the bottoms
on, and they will be supported
by the slides.

For Dick, face-frames and pocket

screws are
the way to
go. To
really crank
out pockets, a Castle
Mortising
Machine is
the way to
go. If you
don't want to
spend
\$2000, a
variety of jigs

are available or can be made to do the job.

Norma brought with her a "plain vanilla" cabinet she is working on, part of a kitchen for an elderly lady who can't afford much. She had to cut a lot of corners on them-not sprayfinishing the interior for example. Norma prefers Apple-Ply for drawer sides and melamine for bottoms. She likes conventional hinges, likes to see the hardware. She does a bit of a roundover on the edges of the face-frames to protect them from dents and soften their appearance. The effect is pleasing.

SHOW and TELL



The seat began as a 2" piece of
Pine. At the end of the week they
each had a chair (and were able
to take it home on the plane!)
Carl's chair was very handsome,
and painted blue.


Sterling Dogan showed us a little of how he turns wooden pens. The blanks are drilled with a 7mm hole into which a brass sleeve fits. Then they are turned on the lathe using a spindle gouge. He sells the parts in small quantities, for large quantities go to "Craft Supply" in Utah. Also, for his shop in Oakland, where he rents the use of his machines, he has just acquired a 37" belt sander.



Joan McWilliams is working to help us get some more advertisers for our newsletter. If you have any ideas, give her a call at (510)490-5036.






