We need more volunteers! Especially, we need a chairman for the Woodworking Trade Show on December 6,7, & 8, in San Mateo. It's not a hard job, and rather fun. We already have a list of people who have volunteered to man our booth, we just need someone to schedule them.

It's time to step up our toys for tots program! Other wood-working associations crank out toys by the thousands! If you need ideas, call Arnold Champagne. He has patterns, ideas... he'll get you started. Also, Arnold could use some TURN-ERS to make toy parts. Come the December meeting, we are going to have a potluck dinner and hand out some prizes for great toys.

Stan Booker introduced our host, Don Segale. Don started in a garage 15 years ago making wood novelties. Now he has a full-line cabinet shop with 20-30 employees. About two-thirds of his work is cabinet refacing.

Don gave us a tour of the shop, talking about his methods and machines. Incoming supplies are forklifted onto pallet racks. He has been frustrated with the quality of red oak plywood he has been buying lately—most of it has to be re-

jected. Some other odds and end of information from Don: Quality comes in once a week to sharpen his blades. Most of the doors for his cabinets are contracted out, door specialists can make them more economically. Water-based finishes, a tricky situation. The new law comes into effect next July, and water-based will be required. But they are far from perfected. He is currently using nitro-cellulose lacquers.

Large pieces of plywood are cut on a panel saw, more accurately and smoothly than can be done on a table saw. Long pieces of stock go to a cross-cut saw with a blade that rises up, rather than being pulled across like a radial arm saw. Components for face-frames go to a face-frame machine, that clamps them tight while drilling diagonal holes to screw them together. (the majority of Don's cabinets are faceframe) The face-frames go to a 52" wide belt sander, and the whole frame is sanded to the same height. Then the crossgrain scratches are taken out with an air-sander. They start with 13/16 stock and take off about 1/32nd.

Gluing is with regular Aliphatic Resin (yellow) glue. Though they no longer do many doors, Don showed us a nifty

machine, a 3-level shaper that could machine all the parts for a door in one setup.

When we moved to the assembly area we got to see some of the results of having computerized design and layout. Each piece has a label with dimensions, material, cabinet #, room #, and lots more. (Special labels are used that don't stain the wood.) The program used "Cabinetware," (about \$6,000) is complex and has a long learning curve. Don says it needs a large shop to make it cost-effective. He has a layout man working fulltime on the computer. One disadvantage is that, since the program optimizes cutting panels to waste the least amount of wood, you have to cut everything at once, which can leave them with a huge number of parts to keep track of (they bundle pieces together with cellophane wrap,


which leaves no residue), and no way to make adjustments if things start going wrong.

Don likes spring-loaded European Style hinges. He says that 120° hinges are great, but with 170° you can expect maintenance problems. He's not keen on touch-latches, because they need to be kept "tuned-up" like a car. They build cabinets with a 3/4 to 1" scribe on the sides. For refacing, they provide new doors and drawers, and cover the sides etc with 1/8" veneers. (Dick Taylor, host of our next meeting, promises to show us how to reface cabinets "ULT." which means "Ultra-low-tech."







