




### When Last We Met

Sig Rich brought in a toy bear, one of the ones that climbs up two strings as a child tugs on them, he said you cannot only give a child a toy, but a lesson in physics at the same time. Also a cute little ghost and a dinosaur, made from scraps of wood and finished with mineral oil.



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### A Message of Inspiration from Fred

In the last newsletter and at our last meeting we talked about making a few toys for distribution to young people at Christmas time. I have been reading some newsletters from other woodworking groups around the country and find we are being out classed.

- San Diego Fine Woodworkers are planning to make 300 toys this year for children.
- The Kansas City Woodworkers made and donated 2,500 toys last year. Their goal is 3,000 this year.
- The Ozark Woodworkers have a goal of 10 toys per member.
- The Wisconsin Woodworkers Guild is setting their goals even higher.
- The Sacramento Area Woodworkers donated over 1,000 toys last year. They are already working together every third Saturday through November.
- The Bay Area Woodworkers are hoping to get maybe 25-30 toys!!!! That's pretty bad.

Let's set our sights up a few steps. What the kids want is a nice simple toy. It doesn't need to be world class, one of a kind. It does need to be safe with as few moving parts as practical. Most of the woodworking publications offer a number of plans. Once you setup to make one, six to ten more are easy. We could even get a small group together and get a small production line going. I recommend that we set a goal of 10 toys each for our club. It's not a lot for a club of our

size - but it's a start. I hope we can count on you to do your part. It's fun and feels good too. You can't

beat that.


TOYS! Don't forget us. Make some toys for our Toys for Tots program. They don't have to be fancy. Arnold Champagne is coordinating that effort.


Fred Esch brought in a very nice sliding platform for his table saw. It has a pivoting bar to hold pieces for cutting various angles.

By the way, we still need a social chairman. Various interesting events have been proposed, but no one is available to organize them. The board members are all very busy folks, and find it hard to find time to fulfill their present BAWA jobs-for new programs we could use some extra hands. Among the proposals is a Saturday tour of various members shops, for fun & exchange of ideas, and a daylong scroll saw workshop by Joanne Lockwood. (After this article was written. Press here to hold small plece next to the fence

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
Arnold Champagne gave a most impressive demonstration of some of the many things he had learned in a class he took on wood finishing. He brought in panels with samples of different finishes. He said that after he had sanded a panel to 400, his instructor said to wipe it with water! If you raise the grain with water and then sand it again, your finish will look much better.

Arnold learned about working pumice. Pumice or other solids such as Plaster of Paris can act as fillers, worked in with a first coat of shellac for instance. A fine finish comes from a flat surface, rather than many coats. He applies finish with cotton pads.

He talked about coloring wood with acrylic colors.It's easy, it can be mixed with water or shellac, and mixed with pumice and worked in. He also described a recipe for wax that he likes, 50% beeswax, 50% Carnuba wax, heated in a double boiler with half again as much turpentine. It's hard and lasts a long time.

Walter Miller showed how he makes small brad-point bits by grinding ordinary drill bits with a cut-off wheel or small grinding wheel.

Alton Jenson unveiled a clock on wheels—produced to the specifications of his grandson! Also a walnut tic-tac-toe board, with walnut X's & O's.



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
### **Tech Tips**

Reprinted from 'American Woodworker' magazine, Oct. 1991.

#### Wedge Vise

This simple holding device is best suited for gripping a board (or door or similar assembly) by its edge. It can be installed on a plank, sawhorse or on the workbench. I make mine out of 2 x 8 stock, but yours should suit the work you do. I use a wedge angle of about 15° and a bevel angle on the wedge of about 35°. A tap on the wedge secures or releases the workpiece.

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If your shop-vac has a foam filter that clogs quickly with wood chips, try covering the filter with old pantyhose. This allows the larger, heavier chips to fall off into the canister when you turn the vacuum off.



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

continued from page 5 Anti-Kickback Hold-Down


I made a combination holddown and anti-kickback device from a 3/4" thick piece of hardwood 4" x 4". On one end, I made a 2" long slot cut at 45°. It holds a piece of lucite, phenolic or similar flexible material as shown in the drawing. You can shim it with laters of tape to get the fit that you want. I install it as needed on the top edge of my auxiliary fence with hanger bolts and wing nuts.



#### Nail Holder

If your fingers can't reach to hold a nail where you need to start it, hold the nail with a loop of string through a soda straw. Slip the nail through the loop and pull the string tight to hold the nail.
