

He left it overnight, and was surprised and pleased when it turned a dark grey-brown. (For faster action you can buy Ammonium Hydroxide at a chemical supply house, but it is <u>very</u> intense stuff.)

Yeung Chan created a beautiful Walnut plant stand in traditional Chinese style, with very interesting mitered and splined joints. He said he might bring in a sample of the joint to show us how it is made.

Sam Logudice entered a shopmade glue-up clamp from a recent Shopsmith plan.

Frank Ryan showed a vase made by gluing together 4 strips of wood, with paper in the joints so they could be broken apart. He turned it on the lathe, separated the pieces, turned them each 180° (so the turned part was on the inside) then turned it again.

Ernie Werkheiser turned a redwood 2x4 into a little table, inlaid on top with a complex pattern made from squares and triangles. He cut them with a jig on the table saw, and they fit together very precisely.

Fred Sotcher made a train of wheeled animals in walnut, with wooden hooks to hold them together. He used a Salad Bowl Finish, wanting to have a non-toxic finish for kids.

Anne Glynn made a Maple corner shelf, with intricately scroll-sawed sides. She taped the sides together and cut them simultaneously.

We voted on the entries and first prize (a one hour flight over the Bay Area, provided by Bob Berryman) went to Yeung Chan. Second prize, a router table, went to Ernie Werkheiser.

SHOW and TELL

Frank Hungler brought in an example of the painted furniture he makes. This one was a table that resembles an olive skewered on a toothpick! He also brought a scrapbook of his entertaining creations.

Neil Tsubota showed a wooden locomotive. He used a water-based urethane to finish it, which he said was "pretty good." Easy to apply and clean up, but expensive at \$10 a quart. Question from a young visitor, "Do you let your son play with that?" Answer, "No."

Walter Miller passed around some Stanley "Short-Cut" saws, which he likes for their aggressive cut, somewhat like a Japanese saw.

Sterling Dogan showed a mallet he had turned, made of glued-up scraps of Maple, Padouk, Walnut, Oak, Bubinga, Brazillian Rosewood, and heaven knows what else. He used an epoxy from Chem-Tec in Ohio, made for fine boat-building. It's very expensive, but excellent for very resinous exotic woods.

Question time

Someone asked for a recommendation on a full-sized table saw. The larger Grizzleys and Jets received plaudits, and the Uni-saw was much touted. Opinions were also requested for jointers. Someone spoke highly of their older 8" Boyce-Crane. Someone else disparaged their Grizzley, because they couldn't align the two tables properly. Bob Berryman said he bought his 6" long-bed Delta ten years ago, with solid carbide blade, which he has not yet needed to sharpen. He said he had no trouble with chip-

ping carbide. A long discussion of carbide ensued, and it was suggested that carbide with a low number was less brittle. The San Jose Mercury News mini want ads were suggested as a good place to buy and sell tools.

The Program

Stan Booker introduced Sterling Dogan. Sterling's shop, American Heirloom Woodwork, is on E. 14th in Oakland. He specializes in turning, and set up a Shopsmith lathe on the platform.


He started by saying that woodturning is unlike cabinetmaking, which is like a real science, with plans and measurements. "Woodturners work from their heads. It is a real art form. You can be taught a few basics, then it's up to you."

With variable speed lathes always start the motor first to be sure the lathe is on a slow speed!

With hard pieces of wood you can cut an "X" in the end, or even drill a little hole to help fit the drive center.

"Tools are as different as people." You can make your own tools from old files. Sterling recommends learning to sharpen tools by eye, rather than using a holder. For soft wood he leaves the burr on.

Start the lathe at the slowest speed until your piece is round. Always check the speed. Once the piece is round there is no set speed—turn at the speed that is comfortable to you.

Sterling showed us how to turn coves, beads and tapers. These are the basics for any woodturning. He said he often cuts bowl stock round on the bandsaw to have a smooth surface to start with. You can temporarily glue a piece to your stock



to have something to attach it by. Use yellow glue and a piece of paper from a shopping bag between the two pieces of wood. Clamp it overnight. When you are done turning whack it with a chisel and it will come loose. Also, Shopsmith sells pressure sensitive double-sided tape that is good for the same purpose.

I haven't done any turning since High School Wood Shop, and it was a pleasure to watch the chips fly. Makes me want to go out and buy a lathe!

TO SQUARE A BOARD

Over the next few months we will be learning the basic methods of squaring, jointing and finishing a board. Arnold Champagne has offered to guide us through the process while sharing some of the knowledge he gained at The College of the Redwoods. To join in the fun and learning experience bring a rough cut hardwood board 1 x 8 x 14 inches and a square. Arnold will get us started, and assign us our homework for the month.




