Sti Stivinson will be talking to us about using math in our methods of work in our shop for making and using jigs. He has worked

in the Machinist trade almost all of his life as a Tool and Die maker. He taught and lectured about machine tool technology at the National Tooling and Machinists Association;

plus he has also made teaching aids to help the students to gain better insight to grasp the material. He also used math in working in his woodshop. In his spare time, he is writing two different types of books: one which will help machinists using math and the other is a numbers puzzle book for both college and high school students.

His woodworking shop is typical of most of the shops in our club, but the way he uses the jigs and fixtures makes the job of woodworking a snap. He looks at a problem he is

facing, he also looks for the easiest solution to the problem. Many times when we are doing woodworking we don't do this. He will


help us in guiding us through some of those problems. Some of the things that are in his shop and were revealed to me during the

interview:

A bandsaw

jig using the rip fence, but the rip fence was upside down and a jig attached. All that is needed is extension rails. Another item was an angle jig by using your trig

WHEN LAST WE MET

The September meeting was at Louis Kern's shop in San Francisco. We were greeted by Louis and Susan Kern, and Ted, the family watchdog. Everyone enjoyed viewing the items in their shop. They told us of a rash of petty burglaries in the neighborhood, and suggested that some of us should do guard duty during the program.

As the meeting got under way Louis handed each person a candle, and passed out some packages of matches. All wondered what this might portend. Some people may have noticed a small flat metal statue on the wall with a missing hand and a candle behind it.

Susan on Louis's cue turned off the lights and then he started talking about how we are living in an age of






Bob Berryman showed us a magnificant spoon holder that he made from a scrap piece of walnut. He used an overhead router to carve out the center section section to hold the spoon.

Larry Harding talked about the Western Railway Museum that is owned by Bay Area Electric Railway Association. Their collection consists of over 100 pieces, with emphasis on items originally used in Northern California.

What would be of particular interest to BAWA members is the woodworking involved in restoring cars. The oldest equipment was primarily constructed of wood. Since the collection ranges from 110 years down to a mere 40 years old and pieces have often been out in the rain for much of that time there is much to be done to repair these old cars.

The museum is always looking for volunteers to work in the shop; however if you wish to to do this you must be a member of BAERA for insurance reasons.

The museum is located on State Highway 12 in Solano County, 12 miles east of Fairfield and 12 miles west of Rio Vista. It is open to the public Saturday and Sunday from 11am to 5pm. Admissior is \$4 for adults, and \$2 for children. The museum has a bookstore with one of the best collections of railroad and transportation books and videos in the country. Membership allows you free admission to the museum, ability to participate in special events, a discount at the bookstore and other rail museums.

Perhaps in 1993 we will be able to have a tour, that is of course if we have a club!

of people have come up to the booth in the past and asked those questions and more. If the item would be for sale, your phone number would be an added plus. This is a good way to get exposure for free.


