





But he says it is the result of almost 20 years of learning and design.

When he first started in woodworking, he designed his own pieces and did a variety of commission work by imitating what he had found inspirational. He supplemented this by working at craft fairs and was a street merchant in San Francisco and Berkeley. During this time, he produced what he called his Dean Rock Boxes which then went for \$3 wholesale, but now are collectors items.

He has been in business for 23 years, has gone bankrupt once and had to start all over again. His work is in Oakland Museum and 165 galleries in 13 countries.

He was been written up in several magazines - they are Wookwork: Summer 1990; Fine Woodworking: #24,#77; San Francisco Business Times: March 19,1990; and Electera: June/July 1990

He is one of the very few designers that truly understands the needs of a person who works at a workstation all day, for the needs of being comfortable.

He will present a slide show, show us jigs and fixtures that he uses to make his business work for him, answer questions and show us around his shop. It should be a fun filled evening so bring your enthusiam, and questions with you.

His place is located at 4210 Holden Street, Emeryville, CA.


When Last We Met

The main feature of our August meeting was a talk by BAWA member Yeung Chan. Yeung asked Stan to introduce him as "just a regular guy who goes to work every day and works hard." But we found that that description was somewhat too modest.

He started by showing us how to make the chinese splined corner joint which has intrigued all of us who have seen it. I'm not able to describe all the details, but I'll give you a rough sketch, and I understand that it is going to appear in an upcoming issue of American Woodworker. This joint is his own invention, though it is similar to ones he has seen on furniture in China, or in books.

Yeung cut the joints on the table saw, using a sliding carriage onto which he had tacked strips to hold the work at 45°. The four legs and four crosspieces must all be the same thickness and perfectly square in cross-section. The blade was raised to exactly half the thickness of the pieces, and the legs were cut twice. After the first cut the leg is rotated 90° and placed on the oppossite 45° angle strip. Here is a hasty illustration of the 3 leg cuts. The rails I didn't have time to do.


Yeung then gave us a slide show, with examples of his work, building prototypes of new furniture, He brought in a prototype chair made of laminated thin pieces of Oak. His company had then sent it as a model to a Danish company to make the parts, which would be assembled here. He also showed us the finished product, and it was interesting to see what had been lost in translation.

He also showed us work he had done making molds for fiberglass chairs, and making patterns to become molds for casting aluminum chair parts. Also, made with MDF, a delicately-rubbed pattern for cast-iron base for a garden table. He cut the shape on a circular blank by using a router on a board that let it move in a straight line, and leaned the board onto a bridge. By moving the bridge he could vary the angle of the board. The blank was rotated and slowly trimmed down.

Also shown were slides of large and ingenious jigs he had built, with air cylinders to hold and rotate chair parts while upholsterers stitched on them.

Also a neat jig to hold down a curved piece as it moved against a slotcutter on a router table.

And we were also treated to slides of antique Chinese furniture from his mother's house in China.


BAWA NEEDS NEW BLOOD




Outreach Santa need our Help?




A gentleman wanted to know where he could get shop space, sorry I didn't get his name.
