

VIDEO TAPE NEWS

Check out the new video tapes from our library!

Did you know that he BAWA library has two new additions to the already large number of videos? The new video tapes are on table saws and bowl turning.

You may ask, "Why doesn't BAWA purchase more NEW video tapes on woodworking?"
We need your opinions! Well, here is your chance to review woodworking videos and send your suggestions to the BAWA librarian. We need your opinions on these tapes. Maybe we can get a "Siskle and Ebert" type of review in this newsletter.

At the last meeting, by the way which was on wood turning, I asked both the speaker and the members to submit suggestions on the "BEST" woodworking videos you have seen. If you want to help out in this project, drop a letter to the BAWA librarian at the address shown on this newsletter.. After my request I did receive a request to review 8 tapes on Routers by Rosendahl. As of this time, the librarian has not had the time to review these, but they will be reviewed before the next issue and I will give you my opinion of these tapes.

Should the BAWA library be expanded?

I brought up this question to the BAWA board members. Many of the new video tapes from



the Taunton Press (Fine Woodworking) can be ordered with a book that assists the viewer in explaining the processes. Should the library be expanded to include books?

This brings me to my next subject about the library. The case I use to store the library is getting heavier and heavier as we add new tapes. If any of you professional cabinet makers have seen plans for a LIGHT WEIGHT portable video tape storage box that can be transported to meetings in the trunk of a car, I'm open to suggestions.

I guess that everyone by now has heard my speech on the cost of the video tape rentals. The board has decided to collect \$5.00 up front for any video tapes that leave the possession of the librarian. If the tape is brought back to the NEXT meeting the borrower will receive a \$3.00 rebate. The net rental for 1 month is \$2.00! Boy, what a bargain! This price beats ANY video rental store I've been in. If you don't return the video to the next meeting the librarian will keep your \$3.00 deposit. This way your net cost is \$5.00 per rental for a month of watching wood working videos.

I am also looking into better ways to send the video tapes through the U.S. Postal System. Because the video image is magnetic, this image could be damaged from the automated postal processing equipment. We may change the box that is handed out at each meeting to see if the video tapes are better protected from a magnetic fields from the Postal processing equipment.

Other Stuff

I recently read an article in "Fine Woodworking" about finishing. This article

was written by a chemist who is also a woodworker. One statement that was made by this author is that most "out of the can" finishes ate too thick. So he thins it out with appropriate solvent.

Wood Dust

One of the fastest ways to ruin a project is to finish it in an area where there is a lot of wood dust. So how do you control wood dust in a home work shop out in your already crowded "California garage?"

I have written for a "small" cyclone with a 1 horse power motor and fan unit to control dust in the garage and am already wondering if this will work for the rest of my house?
