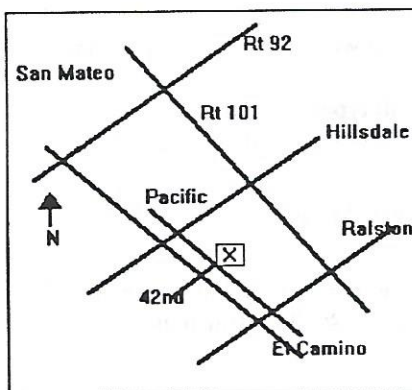

We have all heard about the destruction of the rain forest in South America and felt the impact of the availability of rare and beautiful tropical hardwoods. Many species of American grown hardwoods are also becoming more difficult to obtain as the demand for wood increases.

This month Warren Wise at the Mainliner Club in San Mateo will tell us how his company (The Woodsman) recycles locally grown trees into usable lumber. Hardwood trees that need to be removed from residential backyards and lots are harvested by his company. The wood is then milled and dried at the request of the tree owner or put up for sale to the public. The company also imports and mills exotic hardwood species such as rosewood. Warren will tell us about the many species of California trees that can be used for furniture making as well as tips for harvesting and drying your own lumber. Sign-in and socializing will begin at 7PM.

March to Be Part Host to Woody's 2x4x96 Inch Contest

Woody's 2x4x96" Contest is coming! This contest is dedicated to a member who died while being a President of BAWA. I remember Woody as always giving away to others secrets in woodworking. He made jigs and fixtures, coached newer members with helpful ideas, and made many beautiful items that he displayed at meetings and shows.

I visited various club meetings where the 2x4x96" contest has been held, and I think the San Joaquin Fine Woodworkers Association explains the rules the best: *Entries must be made from one construction grade, 8 foot 2"x4", of Western softwood (fir, hemlock, pine, cedar or redwood) and use at least 75% of the board.* This association had more members participating in a 2x4 contest than I have seen in other clubs in other years. They had fifteen entries.

It would be really great to have woodworkers get really behind this project. We could have 100 members by the time March comes along and it would really warm my heart if everyone had an entry! I think I will use some of the ideas that were at the Christmas party for my entry.

Did you know that many of the libraries have a 2x4 book? I believe it is in section "684". All you have to do is to scale down the project to make it from one 2x4.

Point to Ponder

We had a problem at the last meeting and a couple before that with members talking amongst themselves but within earshot of the speaker and other woodworkers. These talkers were asked to quiet down by a number of members and to talk in a different room, but they didn't. This is not appropriate behavior for members of an adult club.

When Last We Met

The January combination of two clubs joining forces brought a great speaker, Brian Boggs, to bring us knowledge about green woodworking.

Carl Johnson, President of the Peninsula Woodworkers Association, introduced Brian Boggs, who is a green woodworker, to the group. Carl talked about how he was at a seminar taught by Brian. There were nine woodworkers in the class learning how to make hickory bark seat chairs using the green woodworking technique.

Brian first talked about a trip he recently took to Honduras to market little known woods that are harvested in the area. His slide show was very informative. Brian told how the villagers were bringing wood to market and how little they received for their lumber. He also talked about how the local people use a machete and butterknife to make hand planes to smooth a board. Brian is in the process of setting up a chair making shop in Honduras, another reason for him to buy some of the local woods that these people pack out of the woods on their backs. In the future we may be able to get wood samples of that area from Brian.

Next we saw him in his shop and grounds, splitting a green log because it is always easier when green. The logs are usually four feet long. This is the best length because longer lengths are more difficult to split straight. He keeps splitting the wood until getting to the section that will be used for chair parts.

For those without a computer, I will be glad to help in printing your handout.

Many members may have supporting documentation that may be borrowed for the development of a presentation. If you have such reference material on a listed topic, and are willing to lend it to the listed presenter, please contact them.

I believe with the talents we have within the membership, we can all benefit from this program. Usually the ones who learn the most are the presenters, so you need not be an expert prior to the presentation, to do a good job.

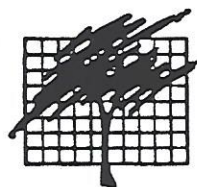

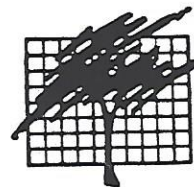
