

It was a Very Green Christmas in '94 by Mark Dennis

As a father of a four year old in a household where both parents work, I don't consider myself as one with extra time on my hands. My weekends are generally filled with catching up on domestic duties that just don't seem to fit in during the week. Yet, as one of the more fortunate citizens on this Earth, I've always felt some obligation to help those whose troubles make mine appear trivial. But without money or time, what could I do?

Christmas in April was the answer.

Twenty-one years ago a small group in Midland, Texas decided to take one day off a year to help others. Now, Christmas in April is a national organization with more than 100,000 volunteers who apply their skills to help refurbish homes, schools and communities. The projects are recommended by churches and other community organizations who are in touch with the needy and funded by corporate sponsors. The goal is to attack a project in need of TLC, completely disassemble it, and reassemble it in mint condition - ALL IN ONE DAY!

Sure I was skeptical, but the challenge was alluring. For example, to paint the outside of my house might take me a week, and that's if I had a week to work on it. Yet, in just one day, a roof was repaired, and the yard and garage were cleaned up, lights were rewired, a 120 foot fence was built, and a whole house was painted inside and out.

Our mission was to rebuild the 2 bedroom home of <xxxx>, an 81 year old widow, whose son and grandson resided with her in East Menlo Park. This particular site was funded by Synoptics Communications, Inc., a computer company in Santa Clara: the labor was supplied by 28 volunteers. My project, along with 5 others, was to tear down and rebuild 120' of redwood fence - not something I'd ordinarily try to accomplish in one day. By the time the pizza arrived for lunch we had removed the old fence, and dug holes for about half of the posts. I thought we'd never make it, but in the afternoon, the posts sprang up and just as we finished putting on the rails, a crew from another house in the neighborhood came over and helped us put on fence boards. We even finished in time to hang a gate and to help the painters move all the furniture back into the house. Despite my skepticism, we had completely transformed this home in one day.

Fortunately I had walked through the house that morning so I was able to witness the transformation. Not only did the home look like new, but the family that lived there was delighted. In the Bay Area alone, 45 homes and four not-for-profit buildings were refurbished that Christmas Day in April. What a sense of hope all the beneficiaries must have felt knowing that their community cared about them and what a sense of well being it gave all of us that we were able to help.
