

Don Wagg, our host, provided a fascinating (and entertaining) presentation on the many techniques and products he uses to refinish or touch up flaws in antiques and other furniture. Don developed experience over the past 20 years using items such as Clorox, crayons, wax sticks, Bondo, and other items used to repair and match the surface of the furniture piece. He explained the use of a variety of

finishes and finishing techniques used to complete the repair, including stains, dyes, sealers, shellac, varnish, wax, pumice, rottenstone, and oils. The meeting provided many useful techniques from someone who is obviously experienced and comfortable attacking a flaw in someone's expensive-or at least sentimental—piece of furniture. You really had to be present to appreciate all the information Don provided. The meeting ended with a tour of his shop, spray booth, and showroom. Thanks for the great evening, Don.
