

The April meeting is when the 2 x 4 contest will be held. This year the rules have been changed. See the



2 X 4 Contest Rules Al Semenero

We will hold our April 17, 1997 meeting at Tool Land, 1369 Industrial Road, in San Carlos.

During our April meeting, we will have the judging of the annual BAWA 2 x 4 Contest. So that everyone has a clear understanding of the rules, here they are:

- 1. You can use a single 2" x 4" Douglas Fir* board no longer than 8 feet.
- 2. Any type of fasteners, except nails, may be used.
- 3. Operables/ornamentals may be used.
- 4. No other materials (such as plexiglass or plastic) may be used.
- 5. There are no other design restrictions.

Let's get *everyone* involved in this year's contest. Don't be shy. Good luck, everyone!


*In the past any type of wood could be used. Starting this year it was agreed to limit the material to only Douglas Fir. This is to eliminate the advantage usually provided by using exotic hardwoods.

The suggestion was made for the club to purchase a Tormek grinder with the appropriate attachments. This package has a list price of about \$700.

The plan is to sign up for rental of the machine for about \$25.00 per week. This would provide members the use of this excellent machine for sharpening planes, chisels, jointer knives, gouges, skews, kitchen knives, etc. without incurring the total purchase price. Once the rental has repaid the purchase price, additional revenue would be added to the treasury. Your input to this idea is appreciated.

Show and Tell consisted of a display of a several differently shaped boxes by **Frank Sainsbury** and a Hot Rod prototype by **Bob Hulgan**.

A cake celebration was held in appreciation for Stan Booker's past two years as President of BAWA. It takes a significant amount of effort to keep the club moving forward and Stan certainly made his contribution.

Sandor Nagysalanczy was the guest speaker for the evening. Sandor is a professional furniture designer/craftsman with more than 15 years of experience building high-end woodwork. A former senior editor of Fine Woodworking, now contributing editor, he has written several books including Workshop Jigs and Fixtures and Woodworking Mistakes. The evenings presentation was on the latter subject.

A slide presentation was used to show tricks to repair wood damage including dents and gouges, the use of Fresco colors with putty, using Knox gelatin (with Iodine to kill bacteria) and fine wood dust as a filler, using a hot nail with crayon or fill stick to fill holes, cutting a Dutchman or adding a knot to patch a surface, gluing a splinter using unwaxed dental floss, and much more. It was a great evening filled with lots of creative ideas collected by Sandor from many professional woodworkers.

The door prize of tickets for the San Jose Home and Garden Show was drawn as was a copy of Sandor's book Woodworking Mistakes won by Bill Henzel. Cathy Booker was the winner of the electric chainsaw raffle prize.
