South on 101:

Take Van Ness to end, (where it becomes S. Van Ness). Turn right at the signal and continue on S. Van Ness. Get in the left turn lane and turn left at signal. Follow along under freeway 6 or 7 blocks. Turn right on Potrero, then left on 15th. Go to Vermont. Look for cars at the corner.


