



Stan Booker has done a fantastic job as Program Director and as a result we have had some very interesting meetings. Craig Mineweaser has done a superlative job editing the newsletter. He has also expanded our computerized membership database."



BAWA: Who We Are

The Bay Area Woodworkers Association was formed in 1982 by a small group of dedicated people who felt the need to strengthen the woodworking community by holding regular meetings, establishing an informal forum for the exchange of knowledge and ideas, sponsoring shows and meeting others in woodworking and related fields. Since then, this non-profit organization has grown to many members.

BAWA meets on the third Thursday of the month at 7:00 PM. Meetings usually have a specific topic, such as router techniques, finishing, turning, or business aspects of woodworking; or focus on a distinguished guest speaker who gives a presentation in his area of expertise. Meetings are held at woodworking shops and businesses in the Bay Area or at a permanent club meeting place (as soon as a new one is found -See notice on page 8.)

LAST MONTH'S PRESENTATION

James Robles and his colleague, Ryan Johnson, had a great display of *DeWalt Tools*. (Oh boy! Tools!) Jim discussed the history of the company and their latest developments. He indicated that when *Black and Decker* bought *DeWalt* several years ago, they soon discovered that *DeWalt* was the third most popular brand of "industrial quality" portable power tools after *Milwaukee* or *Porter-Cable*. So they decided to become the leader in cordless tools.

They have been quite successful with their well-recognized, highly visible bright yellow and black colored line of very powerful cordless tools. *DeWalt* listened to customer feedback and is continuing to expand their line of bright yellow, powerhouse tools – from their sliding, double bevel 12" compound, miter saw (you know, it's the big boy model that member Carl Johnson won recently), to the low vibration scroll saw introduced about a


year ago, and their new portable table saw with capabilities equal to a stationary one.

Ryan talked about the quality of the tools. They have a one full year warranty on parts and labor and will give a free loaner tool in many cases while yours is being repaired. He noted that while one will seldom need to replace the brushes on a portable power tool, DeWalt has designed them to be externally accessible for easy replacement on many of their tools. He said DeWalt is also coming out with a new line of accessories, including saw blades of all types. Some of DeWalt's new stationary line of power tools was also discussed and their Scroll and Sliding Compound Miter Saws were displayed.

"Snipe" (wherein the cut is slightly deeper at the end of the board as it passes through the planer) and the portable planer was discussed. Both presenters indicated that while it is impossible in a portable planer to completely eliminate "snipe," the new *DeWalt* Portable Planer has a four column locking mechanism and 40% larger infeed and outfeed tables to vastly reduce this problem. Blade changing is also much easier on this new model.

The best part came at the conclusion of the program. The members of the audience came forward, actually got their hands on the tools, asked specific questions and best of all, took them for a test drive! Needless to say, the display table was surrounded. Our thanks to James and Ryan and to <code>DeWalt</code> for a great show!

Also a big "Thank You!" to *The Japan Woodworker* for again hosting our meeting and, as always, for allowing our members to get a discount while scooping up some great tools and supplies.

LAST MEETING

Show-and-Tell:

Arnie Champagne displayed a redwood prototype of the foot for a table he is building. This foot has over 32 veneered layers, each on a taper. Arnie answered many questions and explained the process he uses. He keeps each piece in order and uses a paint roller to quickly apply the glue, then assembles and clamps the foot with many clamps. The final piece will be done in Honduran mahogany.


Bob Berryman, who has attended several of Sam Maloof's workshops, showed a small table he is making in the characteristic style of Sam's. However, he has reduced this one to only 26" high by taking a 4" section out of the leg, yet its design proportion is still very pleasing. Bob showed how you put a 3/8" dowel in the top of the single center support. By drilling a matching hole in the center of the top's underside, it is quick and easy to accurately center the the top on the base. The top is fastened to the base with four screws which go through elongated holes in the base, to allow for wood movement. He also showed the template and the joinery for the legs.

Don Naples told how he has been doing an eight-year long "remuddle" of their Victorian house. On the front porch he is replicating a ten-foot long curved handrail with turned balusters. He showed cutoffs of the rail and discussed how he laminated it. He used Tite Bond II glue and worked on top of a large layer of plastic food wrap. He rolled the glue onto each two layers of wood and quickly assembled them. Then he assembled the entire stack and completely wrapped the whole rail in the plastic wrap and clamped the entire assemblage. The wrapping slowed the drying time and allowed him to work the piece into the curve by sliding the layers. He said originally the balusters were nailed in place but he is drilling holes for them and then applying sealant to the baluster end

before inserting it in the rail.

Don also showed a used book he purchased recently which he highly recommends. It's called "What Wood is That?" by Edland and contains

actual samples of each wood type. Thanks to all these members who showed us some very interesting projects-in-progress. We look forward to seeing photographs of the completed work.
