LAST MONTH'S PRESENTATION

Editors Note: For the last two years, Peter Pierobon has been a lecturer and teacher with Department Head, Donald Fortecue of the woodworking program at the California College of Arts and Crafts (CCAC). (There will be a show of the CCAC's student's work at the end of May, watch for it.) We were very privileged this month to be able to see about 100 slides of Peter's work and hear him discuss why and how he does it.

Peter Pierobon is a part time teacher at CCAC and a full-time furniture designer and maker. Peter says the catalyst that got him to switch from ceramics (his major in college) to fine woodworking was the first Biannual Design Book by Taunton Press in 1977. Peter really liked the physical interaction with the material. He studied and worked for a while at Wendel Castle's shop and studio. There he learned how to use all the tools, and has continued to advance technically such that he says, "I can now make anything I can conceive." This is not an idle boast - Peter is very accomplished and teaches students at CCAC many of the technics he's learned.

Peter's early work was an in the Art Decostyle, "like Rhulman's of the "30s." He developed very complex designs, but says "Humor is a part of everything I've done." He "played around" between commissions making whimsical pieces for sale, and surprise - they sold very, very well. Peter then knew he was on to something and has continued to develop own particular style of this kind of whimsical, art furniture over the years. "I also did limited production designs, but I didn't like subbing it all out." Instead, Peter developed a portfolio of commissioned work to supplement his gallery work. He often uses mixed materials, mostly metal and glass with the wood. He showed some pieces, such a desk with a leather writing top which he obtained from a local leather supplier. He dyed it using an aniline dye in an alcohol base. "Apply it, wait an hour, apply again, wait 5 minutes and apply again, until you've get the color you want." (I hope I got that right -Editor.)

For several years he's explored "reductive carving" where you carve away the surface around the design you want to leave raised on the final surface. He page 6

started doing these pieces with a router, and as there grew ever more complicated, he found it taking hours and hours to produce the surface. So he's now drawing on the surface and doing the carving in a few minutes with a chain saw.

Peter has spent years producing many, many pieces in an ebonized finishusing a particular formula he developed. He uses mahogany as it's easy to carve, and the wood grain still shows through the ebonizing to some extent. But he has eventually moved through this to a point where he says of his chain-saw carved pieces, "By obliterating grain and texture [in my latest work], the viewer looks at not how it was made or what kind of wood it is, but at the form."

However, he says, "I've recently started including beautiful wood again [in my work] with veneers, etc. on minimal furniture forms. I'm very interested in sculpture - the relationship of things to one another." So most recently he's gone from scribbling on the surfaces of his pieces and investigating the "relationship objects have with a perceived value," to creating forms that are now completely pierced through. In some pieces he's gone so far as to eliminate the "furniture" aspect entirely and ended with "spaghetti" shaped forms that are too complicated to draw or model. "[So I just] work in a more immediate way with the form, so it changes how you [create the piece.]

And create is what Peter has done. Over the years he has created his own niche in the world of high-end, fine art wood working, with an impressive body of work. He says years ago he started having his work professionally photographed and sending his pieces to galleries which broadened his exposure. He warned that they typically take 50%, but they provide contact and sales with clients. "Along the way

you meet collectors, you send phots and they'll buy some of your work direct." [Also a woodworker can] gain respect [of the public] form direct commissions, shows and being included in books. Twenty years ago, when Peter started doing this, there were only a handful of such artists, now there are literally hundreds around the country. Still, Peter has a philosophy and approach to his work that make his pieces stand out from the others. We were privileged to have him share his work and his thoughts about woodworking with us. It gave us all something to think about in our own work. Thank you Peter!

In response to several questions oft repeated here are all the details of how the contest will run.

Those who signed up for the contest will be supplied a 2 x 4 courtesy of the club at the next club meeting. *Prepare to pick up yours*. The wood will be kiln-dried Douglas Fir, clear if possible. This must be the only wood used for the entry.

Special consideration will be granted to entries made entirely from the supplied wood. (Fasteners and necessary hardware are ok.) Wood shall constitute at least 75% of the entry. For example, a wooden table with a non-wood top is acceptable, if the top does not exceed 25% of the material used. A cabinet using supplied wood over other material would not be accepted.



A small portion of the thousands of new square feet of open studio space for students in the new wing of CCAC's San Francisco Campus.




President Mike Bray (left) presents speaker Peter Pierobon (right) with a certificate of appreciation at the conclusion of his talk.




Peter presented his lecture in the CCAC Board Room, where he showed slides and discussed the details of his twenty plus years of building fine art furniture.
