

Sandor Nagyszalanczy offered tips from his new book, Setting Up Shop. Sandor ranged across all aspects of setting up a wood workshop, and engaged BAWA in a great discussion. Here's just a sampling of what he (and we) covered.

- 1. Lighting: general vs. task lighting, Get C50 overhead fluorescent tubes for almost full-spectrum light without the high cost. Don't use these for the lathe area (strobe effect) unless you install the high frequency ballast (20khz.) Mount drafting lamps to a square peg to drop into bench dog holes.
- 2. Work surfaces: use the height comfortable for you—high for close work, low for big cabinets, etc.
- 3. Vises and bench: make them solid; wobbly = problems.
- 4. Floor covering: thick mats (DriDek) with holes for comfort, especially on concrete; also minimize how much dust you kick up as you move around.
- 5. Power: plenty of outlets in convenient locations to keep tools plugged in. Use GFI power strips. Automatic cord reels for power cords and compressed air lines.
- 6. Permanent sharpening stations: convenient; sharp tools work better.
- 7. Dust: minimize the fine dust especially. Filter at the tool and in a central location. Shopvacs, box fans, open doors, and out-of-doors help. Respirator masks: get one with 2 straps. Keep wearing it long after sanding is done!
- 8. Noise: use ear plugs (or turn your hearing aid off!). Isolate the shop from the rest of the home with sound channel between the drywall and studs. Sound-damping mats under tools can help too.
- 9. Fire prevention: care for oily rags especially! Watco burns easily. Watch out for flammables near sharpening station. Have at least a 3A 40BC fire extinguisher at hand.

BAWA Member's Technique Tipi:

neer Flatiening

I recently purchased a vacuum press from Vacuum Pressing Systems, Inc. of Brunswick, MA (207/725-0935). Included with the press was a procedure for flattening wavy veneer. I am very pleased with both the press and the flattening technique.

I used the technique on very brittle and moderately wavy mahogany crotch veneer. The process is as follows: Generously coat both sides of the veneer with the following mix: 2 parts white or yellow glue, 3 parts water, 1 part glycerin (available at most drugstores as a first aid), and 1 part denatured alcohol. Brush, roller, or sprayer all work for application.

Create the following sandwich: bottom caul (I used 3/4" MDF), 3 sheets of newspaper, 1 sheet of fiberglass window screen, the veneer, another sheet of screen, 3 sheets of newspaper, etc. and the top caul. You may use as many layers of the sandwich as you wish. The screen keeps the newspaper from sticking to the veneer.

Place the sandwich in a press. During the first 24 hours, change the newspaper 3 times and reset the press. On the day, again change the newspaper 3 times. Now you may wave the sandwich outside the press, but it should be weighted.

The manufacturer warns that you must allow at least 2 full days for drying to avoid shrinkage after the veneer is bonded to your substrate. You may store the veneer for future use, but should keep it weighted.

I found the process easy to follow. The veneer emerged very flat and significantly stronger. I was concerned that the presence of yellow glue would affect finishing. I ran a test using a mix of boiled linseed oil and varnish on pieces of treated and untreated veneer and couldn't see any difference. The treated veneer was easy to trim and tape, and bonded well when glued (I used urea resin). If you have questions or can improve on the above, please call Bill Small at 925/735-8260.

President-elect Linda Salter ran an enthusiastic meeting at which we worked over the Holiday Dinner, the Holiday Gift Exchange, BAWA elections, more Showand-Tell, and next year's activities (details in the rest of this newsletter). We greeted guests Paul Honis, who works with computers, metal, and wood; Ann Hillman (wife of George Comstock); Jim Ives, a refinisher; and new member Joe Hourigan.

Show and Tell: Arnie Champagne passed around samples of hand-cut dovetails, and promised us we could do work that good if we take his class (call him). George Comstock brought in his gorgeous strip canoe, the result of an earlier BAWA presentation on canoes and a random comment from a friend.
