

LAST MONTH'S PRESENTATION

Editors Note: BAWA's new Secretary Connie Madera Voos, was kind enough to take these notes of the presentation. She's new to woodworking and she says, 'I did the best I could with the terminology.' I think she did a fantastic job, and thank her for her contribution of this article as well as the meeting minutes for this issue of the newsletter.

This month's presentation was by BAWA Program Chair and furniture maker Arnie Champagne, who demonstrated a work-in-progress, an Edward Barnsley inspired dining table. The two most impressive technical features were the cleverly wedgeveneered table top and the legs which were ingeniously laminated in eyepleasing curves. Arnie explained the steps he followed to design and construct the table, and demonstrated each construction phase, while firing off a variety of practical woodworking tips like an antique Gatling gun. The table top veneers were cut from a piece of wood that Arnie bought because he couldn't resist buying it. The veneers were cut into wedge

piece of wood that Arnie bought because he couldn't resist buying it. The veneers were cut into wedge shapes that were carefully arranged around the table top center like slices of pizza using accurately placed "cabinet-maker marks". Arnie had some problems with "up-down processing" — where different apparent colors of wood were caused by light shining across the surface at an angle — and also used cabinet-maker marks here to preserve the order and arrangement of the veneer pieces once he got them right.

The original thickness of the wood used to make the legs was 21/4 inches. He sliced it into 16 slices by resawing it on a standard bandsaw. [An Arnie tip: Clean your bandsaw blade after every day of use. Arnie soaks his in a bucket of liquid oven cleaner - no brushing. Another BAWA member suggested using baking soda paste.] For the back of the table top, Arnie chose a high-quality finish plywood. He demonstrated how simple it is to join the veneers. He next demonstrated banding the edge of the table top using a clamp setup. Glue doesn't stick very well to the edge of plywood laminations, so the "bake-in" technique is used to place solid wood on the edge of the table to provide a strong gluing surface. Arnie showed us

how the clamps were used to hold the edgewood.

Inlays for the table top were demonstrated. The gluing clamps are difficult to use, and their location and type must be planned out ahead of time, not while the glue is setting up. [An Arnie judgment: If you see the line on a finished inlay, your workmanship was poor.] His sections were made by using four templates. He used *Unibond* glue. He then demonstrated the arrangement of the templates. Lay them down in the chosen pattern and put tape across them until dry, then clean up the bottom and they will be situated well.

Arnie used a vacuum bag for veneering the table top, and he showed us how. [An Arnie tip: veneer both sides at once or you'll end up with a table top no flatter than a potato chip.] He suggests keeping the glued-up table top in the vacuum bag overnight to control the drying process to be slow and even.

The curved base of the legs was created by laminating (could it have been 24?) strips of veneer. A subtle difference in thickness from one end to the other of each veneer strip (obtained by planing each strip's face in a jig) added up to a beautiful set of curves in the glued-up base.

The finished table slides open to accept inserts so the size can be increased to accommodate more diners. But unlike many designs where just the top slides and the legs are stationary, on Arnie's table each half of the entire table, including the leg assemblies, slides open. He used his joiner/planer/handsaw to cut the corners for the table top insert piece.

Arnie provided a fascinating, inside view of his work – he is a very talented designer and woodworker. He showed us a lot of great new ideas that we can immediately use in our own woodworking. BRAVO and THANKS ARNIE!
