
MEETING ANNOUNCEMENTS



THE AUGUST MEETING'S PRESENTATION

Connie Voos and Tony Fanning

Our August presenter John de Marchi designs and sells extremely clever measurement tools. He spoke to us about the principles of measurement that apply to woodworking. John showed us a collection of measuring tools and sold us many of those he designs and manufactures (in a BAWA feeding frenzy after the meeting).

All of us have measured wrong by trusting a tape

measure's hook, and have learned to "read off the one". John, when he was working mostly in wood, had that unpleasant experience with many, many pieces in a single job. This got him really serious about accurate measurement in the shop. Now that he works mostly in metal, he's even more focused on accuracy.

John started with a standard flatness plate as a base (continued on page 4)


John de Marchi presented the August program on measurement and standards, and sold us a bundle of his clever tools (see page 1).

To raise extra money for the BAWA newsletter and other BAWA functions we are starting a silent auction before BAWA meetings.


YOU CAN HELP! Please donate tools, raw wood, wood items, books, magazines, videos, or anything else that another member might want to buy.

for all accurate measurement. In the absence of one, he suggests using the top of a table saw. For high accuracy, John showed us sets of accurately machined (Johansen) spacing blocks which can be combined for thickness and length measurements. He showed similar machined angle blocks.

John recommended good quality inexpensive dial micrometers and electronic calipers with a floating zero setting. The latter are particularly convenient for automatic metric/British conversions.

But the star tools of the presentation were those John himself designs and makes. These included a bevel guage with pivot holes in different locations for different situations; a variety of little brass stops that turn the steel ruler of an adjustable miter guage into a truly accurate tool; combination squares of various sizes that are more like brass and steel jewelry; and beautiful pen-form scribes that have interchangeable carbide steel tips.

John de Marchi showed us how to get the accurate measurements crucial to our work, but the real treat was fighting other BAWA members for John's tools!
