

Last Months Meeting

Announcments

We met at the wonderful Hafele showroom in San Francisco. Visitor Manni Hernandez introduced himself as a hobbyist woodworker, and mentioned that he has taken classes at the Woodworker Academy and a three-month course at Peter Korn's school. Co-Treasurer Tony Fanning said there is \$1,800 in our coffers and they are collecting money for the holiday dinner. Newsletter Editor Mike Bray discussed the booth we had at the recent woodworking show in San Mateo. Outreach Chair Bill Henzel discussed this year's toy workshops. Our last one is coming up. Hospitality Chair Stan Booker has donated 1000+ wood dowels for the group to use in making "Tinker Toy" type toys. Bill passed out maps to the December 9th toy-making workshop at Al Semenero's shop. Bring a benchtop drill press if you have one. So far the club has made puzzles, pull wagons, castle blocks and more. Presi-'dent Linda Salter discussed the Dec. 14th Holiday Party. Arnie Champagne passed around dovetail examples and announced his dovetail class of Dec 2nd and 3rd. Gene Wagg announced he has a dovetail jig and a 16 speed, floor model drill press for sale. It was also announced that the John Grew-Sheriden Shop in SF and Dave Barrett Woodworking in Berkeley would rent out time on their wide belt sanders. Bill Manix announced the Spring Semester (starting January 21st) at Laney College will feature a class by Jay Van Arsdale on Japanese handtools and chisels. Robert P. Larson Co., a local hand tool distributor, presented some examples of their wares. They sold most of what they brought. They were announcing their special sale the following weekend.

Show and Tell

Paul Reif showed a partial mockup of his Japanese-influenced coffee table. He discussed the problems getting glass for the top, and then passed around photos. KERSEY GLASS in Hayward supplied the 3/4" glass top, sandblasted on the underside (2?) Grit sand). Carl Johnson discussed a Shaker style chair he made in Peter Hindle's recent class, using a rotary plane to taper the round legs. The chair is Cherry, with steam bent back slats, and a cloth tape seat. (The class was interupted when Peter, a very experienced woodworker, suffered serious internal injuries from a tablesaw kickback. He was rushed to hospital, but was helping finish the class the next week...minus the damaged innards!!! It could happen to any of us any time, so DON'T HURRY, DON'T WORK TIRED, DON'T WORK DISTRACTED. When you think you are 'good enough' to ignore the safety rules, you put yourself in harms way. Please be careful!)

Mini-Seminar

Bill Manix and Co-Program Director Jay Perrine showed some of the features and advantages of the Tormek water stone sharpening machine in a short seminar. The Tormek system has many accessories available which allow almost every type of edge tool to be sharpened: planer knives; hand plane blades; chisels, etc. - without burning the steel.

Main Presentation

Our own Arnie Champagne was the main speaker. He gave a talk on building a very high-end wall cabinet. It was quite a show. Arnie tried so hard to tell us everything, in such a short time, we confess that the editor was not able to take notes. Here are the points we were able to catch:

In a fine piece of furniture, it pays to make a mock-up. Adjusting proportions can be done easily at this point. Testing jigs and joint ideas are best done on the mock-up as well.

Since labor is such a big factor, the relative cost of the wood is minor. Get the best wood for the job, and don't even worry about the cost!

Arnie, who studied with James Krenov at the College of the Redwoods, stipulates that fine cabinets never use just one wood species. The interior will always be different.

On a cabinet with complicated door shapes, build the door before building the case.

Curved parts can be made by glueing up shop-made veneers in a form.

Because wood reflects light in different ways depending on grain characteristics, we can all enjoy the glory of, say, quilted Maple. Yet the same phenomenon causes trouble too. If you try to bookmatch two pieces, you will notice this. One piece will likely appear darker or lighter than the other, depending on the light source. Arnie spoke of a strategy for dealing with this, but we did not catch what he said.

Thanks, Arnie, for trying so hard to cover everything!

Our membership donated a lot of time and expertise for the Christmas-In-April event.
