This month's meeting is being held at MacBeath Hardwoods in San Francisco. Our guest speaker is Greg Hay from the Sonoma Woodworkers Association.



2x4 Contest

The object of the contest is to see what extraordinary things you can make using a subordinary 2x4. This is a 2x4, douglas fir stud, eight feet long. It may be kiln dried, but may not cost more than \$10.00. This is the only wood allowed for the entry. It's OK to pick through available wood for the piece you want. Wood shall constitute at least 75% of the finished piece. For example, a wooden table with a non-wood top (glass, tile, etc.) is acceptable, if the top does not exceed 25% of the material used. A table using the douglas fir as veneer over engineered wood products (mdf, plywood, wheatboard etc) would not be accepted. Fasteners and necessary hardware are okay.

Each woodworker in attendance will cast one written vote in judging the best entry. Prizes will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Honorable mentions will be mentioned. Honorably. By the way, a publisher is interested in having us do a book about the contest, so your work may get into a nationally distributed book!
