
Our February 2001 BAWA meeting will be in Foster City. However it will **NOT** be the same building we had the Christmas Dinner in, so read the Directions carefully!

Starting promptly at 7p.m. there will be a 20 minute Techniques Talk entitled: "5 Minute Shop-Drawing". This will be a bare bones, practical talk by our own Mike Bray on how to quickly get your project dimensioned and ready for making.

For our main program Jimmy Reina will talk about antique woodworking tools. Jimmy is the owner of Tools, Tools, Tools in Berkeley and a member of the Early American Industries Association.

His focus will be on the evolution of tool making e.g. There was a period when the Industrial Era was upon us here in the US, but in England when the village blacksmith was still there custom-making woodworking tools, while here....well, let him give us the story. He will help us think about the impact of those changes to things like plane irons and the tools that resulted on both sides of the ocean. This should prove an interesting evening - it will focus our minds to think about the evolution of toolmaking and how we eventually got to where we can look in the catalog and buy tools without discussions with a blacksmith. Our speaker will discuss tell-tale signs that let us know when, where and how a tool was made. With his current tool business and his love of antique tools this should be a very interesting and lively time. He will also entertain our questions, suggest books and talk a bit about collecting antique tools. He will have only a few tools for sale. Check out his website before the meeting: www.toolx3.com

The details of the meeting location are: We have the Port Room from 7 to 10 PM. It is upstairs from the Foster City Library. The stairway up is at the north end of the building. There will be large "BAWA" signs guiding the way.

Directions:

From 101, take the East Hillsdale exit. Drive a mile plus toward the Bay. Turn right on Shell Blvd.

From the East Bay, take the San Mateo Bridge (92 west-bound), take the Foster City Blvd exit, and head southeast. Turn right on East Hillsdale Ave and left on Shell Blvd. Get in the left lane, go down past the library, and hang a U-ee, then turn into the parking lot that goes behind the library. The stairs to the community rooms are at the north end of the building.

From 92 eastbound, exit onto Foster City Blvd, turn right on Hillsdale, turn left on Shell, and do the U-ee thing.

Techniques Presentation

Long time BAWA member **Don Naples** did one of our new 20-minute **Technique Talk** presentations at 7:00 PM, on steam bending dried hardwood. He shared with us how he steam bent long pieces of solid, kiln-dried hardwood for the top rails and baseboard of a new staircase he's building in his house. This is a "they said it couldn't be done" kind of story. He passed around photos showing both the steam box he built plus the massive jig he designed and constructed to clamp the piece while it dried. Each piece requires a different jig. He worked through this entire process with a trial-and-error approach. When it's finished, we think this will be a mind bending staircase.

Most of the presentation centered on what the company does now, and how their methods have changed over the years. They are moving towards more contemporary styles, since their traditional niche is crowded with competitors. They are also getting away from the bench-built furniture making process. Still, even though they are moving towards a manufacturing philosophy, John gave several cases where the special talents of individual craftspeople still strongly affected the quality of the work.
